Page III-6 LOCUS C-4 (FIG. III-2)

Locus C-4 is located just east of the Chestnut Hill Plaza shopping center and is the site of a razed house lying near a slight rise of land that is relatively undisturbed. Investigation of this area resulted in the finding of only late nineteenth and early twentieth century debris. No cultural material was retained from this site. No further investigations are considered necessary for this site.

Page III-4

Page III-7 LOCUS D-1 (FIG. III-2)

Locus D-1 was intensively investigation due to the potential for both prehistoric and historic resources. Surface examination of the area resulted in the recovery of one historic artifact, a fragment of Whiteware. Ten sub-surface post hole tests were placed on both sides of the present roadway, with negative results. No further investigations are recommended for this site.

Page III-7 LOCUS D-2 (FIG. III-2)

Locus D-2 consists of a small Knoll that appeared likely to contain evidence of a historic structure. Four post hole tests were excavated with negative results. Surface examination of the area resulted in the recovery of two sherds of Redware and two quartz fragments. No further work is recommended for this site.

Page III-8 LOCUS D-6 (FIG. III-2)

Locus D-6 is a rise located adjacent to and lying on the south side of Route 4, approximately one quarter mile west of the intersection of Route 4 with Route 273 (Ogletown). The rise is obviously a home lot, and surface examination reveals the presence of a stone cellar hole and foundation. Immediately to the rear of the 20' by 25' cellar hole is a brick lined well that has been partially capped with concrete. Surface examination of the area resulted in the recovery of historic artifacts including Whiteware, Redware, Brick fragments and Bottle glass. The reluctance of the landowner to allow trespass precluded any subsurface testing. Further investigation of this site is considered necessary. The site will be totally destroyed by the construction of the road.

Page III-8 LOCUS E-3 (FIG. III-3)

Locus E-3 is a large rise of land overlooking several wetland woods

just to the northeast of the Thomas Ogle House site. Visibility was relatively good and sub-surface testing was undertaken. The testing produced historic artifacts (2 Whiteware sherds) and two prehistoric artifacts (1 fire cracked rock and a fragment of quartz). Further work is recommended for this site should the rise of land be incorporated in the future interchange construction program.

Page III-10 LOCUS E-5 (FIG. III-3)

Locus E-5 is on a slight rise elevated over the surrounding lowlands. Eight post hole tests were done with negative results. Surface examination of the area resulted in the recovery of historic artifacts (2 Whiteware, and 1 fragment of Bottle glass). No further work is considered necessary for this site.

Page III-11 LOCUS G-2 (FIG. III-3)

Locus G-2 is situated in an upland flat, approximately one hundred yards east of Locus G-1. Surface examination of the area resulted in the recovery of two prehistoric artifacts, a fragment of flint and a quartz biface. Visibility was good and no additional investigations are considered necessary for this site.
