Project Background

- Pedestrian fatalities in Delaware
- Advisory Council on Walkability and Pedestrian Awareness was created in April 2006 to help develop the 2007 Delaware Statewide Pedestrian Action Plan.
- Some notable recommendations from the 2007 plan that were implemented:
 - Adopted a Complete Streets Policy.
 - Split the current Bicycle and Pedestrian Coordinator position into two positions (Bicycle Coordinator and Pedestrian Coordinator).
 - Designated a full-time DelDOT Title II ADA Coordinator.
 - Modified design process and subdivision review process to include sign off approval of Title II ADA Coordinator,
 Pedestrian Coordinator and Bicycle Coordinator.
 - Developed and maintain an inventory of existing pedestrian facilities, and identify all elements that are not ADA compliant.
 - Integrated transportation and land use planning at all levels of government.
- Reestablishment of the Pedestrian Council in October 2015
- Pedestrian Council Status, 2023

Purpose: Update the 2007 Delaware Pedestrian Action Plan.

Phase 1 (Draft Being Finalized)

- Collect and summarize existing pedestrian plans and DelDOT initiatives.
- Began pedestrian crash cluster and connectivity mapping.
- Develop project website.
- Began Public Involvement.

Phase 2 (To begin Spring 2023)

- Public outreach.
- Internal DelDOT coordination to explore changes to programs and policies.
- Additional pedestrian crash cluster, connectivity and equity mapping.

Phase 3 (To begin Fall 2023)

- Implementation plan with potential new action items, countermeasures, policies, or programs to improve ped connectivity and safety.
- Additional Public and stakeholder outreach.
- Establish performance measures.

Phase 3 >>> Step 3: Select Countermeasures.

Phase 3 >>> Step 4: Develop an Implementation Strategy.

Phase 3 >>> Step 5: Institutionalize Changes to Planning and Design Standards.

Phase 3 >>>> Step 6: Consider Land Use, Zoning and Site Design Issues.

>>> Step 7: Reinforce Commitment.

>>> Step 8: Evaluate Results.
